IN THE UNITED STATES 3,000 TROOPS HAVE BEEN ORDERED OUT ON PATROL AFTER RENEWED RIOTING IN THE NEGRO QUARTER OF CHICAGO.

THE INDIAN PRIME MINISTER, MRS. GHANDI, IN A MOSCOW TELEVISION BROADCAST HAS AGAIN APPEALED FOR PEACE TALKS ON VIETNAM.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA HAS ORDERED THE EXPULSION OF AN AMERICAN DIPLOMAT.

A wave of violence in Chicago has broken out again, this time in daylight, after three successive nights of street fighting. 3,000 troops of the United States National Guard, called in by the city police to help them quell the disturbances, have been ordered to patrol the streets and they have orders to shoot back if fired on. Gangs have gone through the trouble area smashing windows, looting shops and throwing stones at policemen. Over two hundred arrests have been made. On Thursday night three negroes, including a 14 year old girl, were killed and ~~50~~ 70 people injured in the clashes. A BBC correspondent says that civil rights workers, urging non-violence, are becoming powerless. "Violence has become fashionable" he adds, "especially among gangs of youngsters."

The Indian Prime Minister, Mrs. Ghandi, speaking to the Soviet people on Moscow television, has renewed her appeal for peace talks on Vietnam. Earlier, she again indirectly accused China of seeking to promote tension. She said that a major Asian power had broken a pledge of peaceful co-existence made by Afro-Asian nations eleven years ago. A correspondent in Moscow, in a dispatch to the BBC, quotes Indian sources there as saying that Mrs. Ghandi is disappointed that her plea for re-convening the Geneva Conference on Indo-China has fallen on deaf ears in the Kremlin. According to these sources, the Soviet Prime Minister, Mr. Kosygin, is understood to have told Mrs. Ghandi that Russia can do nothing without first being asked by Hanoi. Mrs. Ghandi leaves Moscow on Saturday just before the British Prime Minister arrives there for talks with Mr. Kosygin.

Russia has refused to allow six journalists, two British and four Americans, to go to Moscow from London to cover Mr. Wilson's visit. The Soviet Embassy gave one of them a visa but later he was told it had been cancelled.

France's view that the only possible solution to the Vietnam crisis is for all parties to observe strictly the 1954 Geneva agreement is again stressed in a communique issued in Paris after talks between President De Gaulle and the King of Laos. It says the worsening situation in Vietnam threatens the independence of Laos.

There have been more air raids on North Vietnam. A United States spokesman in Saigon said American planes attacked a missile/about 40 miles ^{site}

miles South of Hanoi, and one was shot down by anti-aircraft fire. There has been no comment on the North Vietnam radio report that the Hanoi area was raided. The North Vietnamese say that six planes were shot down over Hanoi and three other places and several airmen were captured.

In Washington, eighteen senators known for their opposition to any escalation of the Vietnam war, have called on the North Vietnamese not to execute captured American airmen. They issued a statement underlining the increasing concern in the United States for the men's welfare, which warned that any execution would incite a public demand for swift and sure retaliation. It would drastically reduce the influence of all those in the United States who tried to curtail the fighting, the statement said.

The Czechoslovak government has ordered an official of the American Embassy in Prague to leave the country within three days because of alleged espionage activities. A Czech news agency says the expulsion order was given to the American Ambassador together with a protest against what the Czechoslovak Foreign Ministry called 'absurd accusations' that two Czechoslovak officials had tried to plant a secret microphone in the State Department in Washington.

The Swiss government has banned the Communist-backed World Peace Council from holding further meetings in Switzerland. A government announcement says this is because of attacks on foreign governments and heads of state, by delegates at the Council session in Geneva last month.

A warning by the British Prime Minister, Mr. Wilson, that stern measures would be necessary to solve the nation's economic crisis, has been followed by wide-spread selling of shares on the London Stock Exchange. On the Foreign Exchange market the pound showed signs of recovery, though gains were not maintained into the afternoon. The BBC Economics correspondent says Britain seems to be heading for a period of austerity, but the government do not expect their measures to cause more than a very modest rise in unemployment.

A Canadian Admiral says he has been dismissed after a dispute with the government over a plan to merge Canada's Army, Navy and Air Force, into a single service. He is the chief of Canada's Atlantic Fleet. He is quoted as saying that the merger will destroy the Navy's identity without improving efficiency. Three other rear admirals also disagreed with the plan and are said to be seeking early retirement.

The United States has recognised President Onganena's government in Argentina. This follows similar action by Britain and sixty other countries.

Chile has increased the price of its copper to five shillings a pound. The increase of sevenpence a pound brings the price to nearly twice the level at which it stood before last April's big increase.

The Chicago hospital at which eight young nurses were murdered has offered a reward of 10,000 dollars for information leading to the killer's arrest. Police are waiting at the bedside of the sole survivor of the massacre, who is still suffering from shock.

ATHLETICS Britain has named a team of thirteen to compete against the United States in Los Angeles on July 23rd and 24th. The move comes after the withdrawal of the Soviet Union from their scheduled match with the Americans.

Australia and New Zealand Commonwealth Games athletes will also be taking part, but not Ron Clarke.
