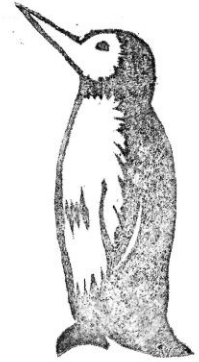

A struggle for power in Yugoslavia:- The Vice-President, who fought side by side with President Tito during the war, has been forced to resign. He had over-all responsibility for the Security services, and was regarded by many as a likely successor to Tito himself. The Security chief is being expelled from the Communist Party. These moves came after President Tito had informed Yugoslavia's Communist leaders that a splinter group inside the Security service had tried to impose its power on the people, the party, and the society. He said they had penetrated throughout Yugoslav society, and their activities had made it impossible to get work carried out.

The leading Chinese newspaper, says that a group of people who have been trying to grab power in China in order to restore Capitalism, has been crushed. The newspaper said that it was the third major struggle against the party in the past sixteen years.

\*\*\*\*\*

American aircraft have bombed fuel depots in North Vietnam for the third day running. Their latest raid was on the depot 15 miles from the port of Haiphong. In South Vietnam, planes accidentally dropped bombs on a village near Saigon. Five civilians were killed, and more than forty wounded.

There has been more world-wide reaction to the American bombing. The Soviet Communist Party leader, Mr. Breshnev, said that because of the raids the Soviet Union will increase its aid to North Vietnam. China has also professed support.

The Council of the ANZUS Pact, whose members are Australia, New Zealand and the United States, has said it recognises the military necessity for the bombing, but another of America's allies, Italy, has expressed concern at the latest attacks.

In the House of Commons there has been renewed pressure on the government to hold a special debate on Vietnam.

The British Foreign Secretary, Mr. Stewart, has had talks in Jakarta with the Indonesian Foreign Minister. The Foreign Secretary, the first British minister to visit Indonesia since confrontation began against Malaysia three years ago, said he hopes his visit will open a new and happy chapter

between Britain and Indonesia.

\*\*\*\*\*

The Americans have launched an unmanned spacecraft, which they hope will become their first satellite to go into orbit around the moon. The spacecraft is designed to find out more about radiation risks to astronauts. Shortly after its launching, officials said it appeared to be on course for its three-day journey to the moon.

\*\*\*\*\*

Reports from the Pacific island of Tahiti say that the French nuclear test which is due to take place about now on an atoll 800 miles away, has been postponed because of bad weather. Ships of foreign navies are reported to have taken up positions just outside the test area to observe the blast.

\*\*\*\*\*

The British Government has published its controversial Bill to re-Nationalise the country's iron and steel industry. Fourteen big companies will be taken over, and run by a national Steel Corporation. The method of assessing compensation to share-holders has been altered by the government, and according to one estimate they are now expected to receive just under £500 million, which is about £70 million less than originally proposed.

\*\*\*\*\*

West Germany is to attach a special commissioner to the 60,000 French troops in Germany now that they have been withdrawn from the NATO Command. The French will have to get the commissioner's permission for troop movements. West Germany has told her that the troops can stay until a permanent solution is negotiated, but negotiations must not take too long.

\*\*\*\*\*

West Germany's Defence Minister has said that West Germany's Defence Budget will have to be raised next year. He told Parliament in Bonn that he expects it will go up by about £180 million, to about £1,750 million. Referring to the foreign exchange costs incurred by Britain in keeping troops in Germany, he said that about half of the £54 million due to Britain by the end of the year is still outstanding. He said it might be possible to honour the agreement but it would be difficult.

\*\*\*\*\*

Yesterday was the fiftieth anniversary of the start of the battle of the Somme, one of the bloodiest battles of the First World War. It cost 1,200,000 casualties, almost equally divided between the Allies and the Germans. When the battle ended, 4½ months later, the Allies had gained only six miles of ground.

\*\*\*\*\*

The United States has introduced its MEDICARE scheme, to provide government medical aid for nearly 19 million American men and women. The scheme is financed out of taxation, and will provide cheap hospital

facilities and other medical attention for people over the age of 65.

\*\*\*\*\*

Britain is to grant independence to the Caribbean island of Barbados on November 30th. The Colonial Secretary made the announcement at a conference in London to discuss the island's future.

\*\*\*\*\*

A new President of the Dominican Republic has been sworn in. This marks the return to constitutional rule after the civil war which followed the ousting of the Left-wing President. The new President defeated the previous president at the polls.

\*\*\*\*\*

In Aden, four British soldiers and three Arab civilians have been ~~SEVERE~~ wounded in grenade attacks. One soldier was wounded when a grenade was thrown at a patrol; when another patrol went to investigate a second grenade was thrown, causing the other injuries.
