World News.

In Indonesia President Sukhano has been told by a deputation of senior army ~~ministers~~ leaders to bow to public opinion, or face the wrath of the mobs. The control of the government has now been handed back to these officers.

The Indonesian Communist party has been outlawed, but the policy of the country will still remain leftish. Any attempts to change it, either left or right, will be stamped out by the new regime.

20 people have been killed in two days of rioting in Calcutta, which started after demonstrations on the food shortage.

In the Congo police have clashed with demonstrators protesting against a government plan to create a separate state for the Seaque community.

France has told her NATO allies that she expects the two NATO headquarters in France to be removed as soon as possible.

French police to-day evicted delegates of the Nationalist Chinese party to UNESCO from their embassy. She says that the embassy belongs to Red China.

The South African Foreign Minister has said that his country dare not interfere in the Rhodesian crisis at present for fear of unpleasantness with Black Nationals.

The foreign ministers of all the countries in the Arab League are meeting in Tunisia.

Booby traps exploded in police cars in West Berlin yesterday, seriously injuring one policeman, and slightly hurting another.

SCIENCE JOURNAL.
